February saw 340 visitors

So far in 1998, we have had visitors from 28 states and four foreign countries, Australia, Canada, England and Israel.

Prairie News

(notes from Harvey Payne's talk on March 14, 1998, Docent Reorientation)

Many of you heard the news about Kenneth Adams. He was accidently gored by a bison at his ranch near Bartlesville while feeding the bison an apple. He has returned home and is expected to recover fully.

Kenny Shieldknight, Preserve foreman for many years, has resigned his position at the Preserve to accept another job. He and his wife, Royce, and daughter, Billie Jean, will be moving to Shidler. His resignation is effective 4/3.

The new Prairie Earth Hiking Trail is being constructed at the Preserve in an area to the north of the current long trail. It will be two miles or so in length. This area (including the north half of the older long trail) is no longer part of the bison range. During roundup, these sections of trail will be closed because they are a part of the "trap" area for the bison corrals. Short cuts along the fence have been cut for use by trail guides and by the public during those two "roundup" weeks in late October.

Trail brochures and signage are being revamped to change the focus to landforms and away from seasonal events.

New steps and gravel have repaired eroded areas of lower trails.

The old barn and shed, just north of the parking lot, may become the new gift shop and nature room! Plans are under way to make this structure inhabitable. Materials stored here will be moved to the new shop building being built just north east of this barn. The new gift shop/nature room building will more than triple our current space!

We overwintered 626 bison on 8600 acres at the Preserve. Another 2500 acres will be added to the bison unit this year. This area includes the "107" pasture, which surrounds the south scenic turnout. Twenty percent of the entire bison unit is burned each year, 40 percent in spring, 20 in late summer and 40 in fall.

In another six years we should reach our target herd size of 2200 animals. This will be a mostly female herd. Females will be sold at age 13, and males at age six.

Cattle still provide a grazing influence on parts of the preserve, but the number is streadily shrinking as bison numbers increase. About 8000 will graze on the preserve during the spring/early summer season. Eventually, 1000 head or less will graze within the Preserve.

Spring Events

Ranchers burn their pastures. The fires, like those caused by lightning, turn the matted dead grasses into fertile ashes and delectable, celery-green growth; open the sod to sunlight; promote lateral shoots, kill non-native species and clear space for annual plants, bird nests and rodents.

Spring azure butterflies appear even before plum buds open.

Lovestruck greater prairie chickens, one of the Preserve's most common birds, gather at hilltop leks to dance and boom at dawn from April to mid-May.

Coyotes, foxes and bobcats patrol prairie chicken leks.

Au zoma kaliova konigora:

Spring rains percolate through limestone, dam up above layers of impermeable shale, and flow out in seeps and springs.

Cinnamon-colored bison babies frolic. Adults are shedding.

Owls, hawks and snakes search for new-born evening bats.

Common nighthawks lay mottled eggs on barren rocks. Mourning doves and upland sandpipers nest in grasses.

Nine-banded armadillo babies (quadruplicates!) are born.

Redbud trees and ground-level flowers bloom in blues, whites and yellows -- edible onions, strawberries and plums; bluets, anemones, field pussytoes, johnny jumpup, phlox and milk vetch.

Delicate white-tailed deer babies -- twins that weigh four to seven pounds each -- are born in May.

Butterfly and moth larva eat leaves, fruits and flowers, lichens, dry leaves and wood, or bore into plants and trees.

Henslow's sparrows call "tsi-lick" from unburned grass plots.

Bison hooves cut the banks of streams and ponds, trampling sedges, duckweeds and water ferns, and scattering frogs, garter snakes, dragonflies, butterflies, mosquitoes and the occasional opossum.

Cattle can get hit by lightning. Cowboys on horseback warily watch the clouds.

Eastern meadowlarks, dickcissels, grasshopper sparrows and other prairie songbirds teach their babies to fly during June.

Western massasauga rattlers, timber rattlers and copperheads sunbathe.
