Visitation

"We had 703 sign-in visitors in August, down 26.8% from August 1998. 44 visitors were from 12 other countries: Canada (10), France (9), England (6), Australia and Germany (4) each. New countries were Argentina, Trinidad & Tobago, Burma and Taiwan. 228 were from 31 other states with Texas (31) and California (23) leading, followed by Iowa (18), Kansas (14), Arkansas (13) and Missouri (13)."

"431 Oklahomans visited the Preserve. So far this year, we have had visitors from 38 other countries and all 50 states."

"Friday and Saturday were the days of highest visitation. 56.6% of visitors came from 11:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. 22.4% of visitors came between 3:30 and 5:30 p.m."

"The total of 7,518 visitors for the first 8 months of the year is up 3.0% over 1998. Visitation from other states is down 8.8%. The number of foreign visitors is up 21%."

"Hot weather undoubtedly caused the lowered visitation."

- Cowboys are at work expanding the bison corrals & spraying serecia lespedeza.
- 800 acres in 3 units was burned in bison unit in late August, plus 415 acres north of HQ in Spring Trap
- Still no information on July 29th shooting of the 3 bison. Reward is now \$5,000.
- New article just out in the <u>Journal of Range</u> Management, Vol. 52, No.5, Sept 99 by Mario Biondini, Al Stenter & Bob Hamilton: "Bison use of Fire-Managed Remnant Prairies."

- The Monarch butterfly migration peaked in the 3rd week of September.
- September rains have given us a good late summer wildflower showing. Lots of yellow: Maximillian sunflower, goldenrod, and broomweed.
- We have had recent troubles with Headquarters water system. Please don't water trees until further notice.
- The large hackberry tree in the Bunkhouse courtyard will be cut down on September 28th. After being struck by lightning in June, it gradually died this summer.
- Radio has been repaired it was hit by the same lightning bolt that hit the tree.

to let us know you are coming.


ALERT: We have no janitor service at the new shop. Please help by cleaning the bathroom and the shop when you have spare minutes.

Fall Events

Chiggers are no longer a problem after the first frost.

Eastern cottontails turn from reddish brown to grayish, and frequently nest around corrals and stacks of oilfield pipes.

Jack rabbits prefer open prairies and fields of short grasses.

Seed dissemination from grasses happens now.

In moist seasons, the "turkey foot" seed stems of the big bluestem reach up 10 feet or more.

Roots reach that far down.

Grasshoppers are eaten by voles, mice and woodrats. They, in turn, are eaten by coyotes, foxes and weasels. Lightning-causes fires burn red cedars and other brush off the grasslands and back into the breaks and hillsides. Leadworts and phlox attract large, yellow cloudless sulphur butterflies.

Goldenrods and sunflowers peak in September.

Moths and butterflies flutter south, hibernate, or lay eggs.

Fall colors peak in October.

Migrating monarch butterflies encloud oaks on October evenings.

Bison are rounded up, tested, vaccinated and inspected by Preserve cowboys and scientists.
